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Course Description

The theology of the Word of God. Theological and pastoral principles of preaching. A practicum of preaching.

Course Objectives

- To recognize that Christ is the primary preacher and the role of preaching in light of this first principle.
- To help foster a pastor's mind when preparing to preach to a faith community.
- To understand the ministry of preaching as a vital and necessary part of building the Kingdom of God and how the preacher should be moved by this reality.
- To help the student move from abstract theological concepts to concrete stories and expressions needed for preaching.
- To help develop communication skills.

Course Assignments and Evaluation

Because this course is primarily a practicum, the emphasis is on writing and evaluating homilies. There is, however, also the theology and theory of preaching. The following requirements take these two facts into account.

Outline, prepare, compose and preach 4 homilies (for those in STP 581) / 3 homilies (for those in MPS 281) to be presented in class. The first homily will be a working homily on which we will be attempting to create a proper style that will help to create a unified and interesting homily. The emphasis of this first homily will be on the creative style of writing a homily. It will be presented 2 times for marking. The 4th homily



(*Graduate Students only*) will be marked 2 times again in order to confirm a growth in homiletic style. Some of the homilies <u>may</u> not necessarily be presented to the whole class.

All the homilies will be graded according to their theology, structure, style, their appropriateness to the given audience and circumstance and, the effectiveness of the presentation by the preacher. NOTE: Other persons may be invited to help in the evaluation. You will be asked to write and preach for the following situations:

- 1. A Sunday Eucharistic Celebration (30% STP 581; 35% MPS 281)
- 2. One of the following special celebrations given to the student by the instructor (15% STP 581; 20% MPS 281)
 - o A Marian feast
 - o Christmas (Mass in the night)
 - o Christmas (Mass during the day)
 - Good Friday
 - Easter Sunday
 - Trinity Sunday
 - Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ
- 3. One of the following sacramental celebrations given to the student by the instructor (15% STP 581; 20% MPS 281)
 - First Holy Communion
 - o Penance Service
 - o Marriage celebration
 - o Funeral
- 4. (Graduate Students Only) A homily/reflection set for a particular audience chosen by the instructor (25% STP 581)
 - o A high school gymnasium
 - o An elementary grade class
 - o A seniors' home
 - An extended care facility
 - o A Remembrance day celebration
 - o The Knights of Columbus
 - o The Catholic Women's League
 - o The youth group
 - o A summer camp with 100 thirteen year olds in a field
- 5. Final oral exam concerning the theology and theory of preaching. (15% STP 581; 25% MPS 281)

All written documents are to be typed using:

- Times New Roman
- 12 Font
- Double spaced
- Right Justified
- 1 inch margins top, bottom and sides

When you present the homilies, you may choose to make the font larger for your own personal use. That same text, however, must be handed into the instructor using the noted style.

 - o The Word of God forms the preacher
 - o Preparing & creating a unified homily
 - o Communication in a contemporary culture
 - o Preaching at special celebrations Weddings, Funerals, with children
 - Communication Skills
- Along with the major themes, time is given to experience the assigned homilies that have been prepared.

General Academic Information

Late Submission Policy.

Late submissions are accepted if the student has previously informed the professor (at least 2 days prior to assignment due date) and given <u>adequate explanation</u> for such tardiness. If there is good reason and the work is handed in at the new time negotiated by the professor with the student, there will be no penalty reflected in the mark. If the assignment is not handed in on time, it will not be marked and the student will receive 0% for the assignment.

Course Attendance

No credit will be given for a course if the student has been absent, for any reason whatever, from one-third or more of the lectures and/or seminars scheduled for the term. Likewise, no credit will be given if term assignments or other assignments are or remain incomplete.

Leave of Absence and Policy for Incompletes

Extensions to an incomplete grade may be granted in extenuating circumstances, but may not exceed 16 weeks following the end of the course. Students who fail to complete course work by the agreed deadline will have a grade assigned which is based on work completed.

Acts of academic dishonesty (plagiarism, cheating, etc.) are subject to an appropriate penalty. The grade "F" may be assigned to a student guilty of such acts by the professor of the course in which the infraction occurred.
