Course Description

The basic responsibilities, skills and attitudes of ministry today, particularly in the parish context. These include: understanding the parish reality today and its pastoring; working with Parish Councils and Finance Committees; sacramental preparation; collaborative ministry and team building; conflict resolution; spirituality for today's ministry; pastoral approaches to today's youth; self-care for ministers; and some other practical issues for today's effective ministry in parishes.

Course Objectives

- Students will develop a theological understanding of the ecclesial nature of lay and ordained ministry, rooted in Christology and Pneumatology, Baptism and the Sacrament of Order. They will have an understanding of the various dimensions of ministry as an ecclesial practice, and criteria for discerning the quality and character of effective ministry.
- Students will understand the importance and place of ministry as a vocation from God, a call mediated through the Church and expressed by means of ordination, institution, and blessing.
- Students will have an opportunity to reflect on the human qualities that make for effective ministry, particularly the ministry of pastoral leadership.
- Students will understand and critically reflect on basic parish administrative structures and practices



• Students will reflect on the nature of evangelization and ministry within a parish context. They will reflect on "best practices" in parish ministry in a North American context, with a view to their own engagement in ministry.

Course Requirements

This class comprises 36 hours of instruction and seminar-style discussion. Students must attend all classes and are expected to prepare for each week by doing the assigned reading and being able to



participate in class discussions. Discussions will review the assigned readings. The readings, the personal reflections, summaries and reflection on best practices are all intended to give each student an integrative reflection on ministerial practice and their own preparation for future ministry.
